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HOKKAIDO: Sapporo—Sapporo is the capital of the Hokkaido (Yezzo), 350 [*sic*] miles north of Tokyo; Station occupied 1887. Missionaries—Miss S. C. Smith, Miss Mary B. Sherman, Miss I. M. Ward.

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[Weston T. Johnson's report]

I have a very fine lot of agricultural students studying the Gospel of Mark. I hope to see some permanent results before the class disbands in June. Mrs. Johnson has taken the daughters of the Vice-Governor and is training them in foreign ways. They are two very bright young ladies, and the fact that they are coming to our house for instruction is a door opened into a very large field of missionary work.

There has been an enrollment of 200 in the *Sapporo Girls' Boarding School*, with an average attendance of 150 and with 192 of the pupils paying. Fifty-three are boarders. Ten were graduated during the year and fifty-eight united with the Church. Miss Ward says:

In the school we have started a Christian Endeavor Society and a Junior Endeavor Society, both of which are very full of life. These societies take the place of the former King's Daughter and Helping

Hand Circles. They have, besides having most interesting meetings every Sunday, given money for various good causes, including the church and a sum of sixteen yen for the famine sufferers.
