HOKKAIDO STATION

PRESENT EQUIPMENT.—*Northern Light School for Girls* at Sapporo, and *Kindergarten School* at Otaru.

Although the missionaries reside in two different places in two towns—Sapporo and Nokkeushi, which are 300 miles apart, the whole work is included under one station. The time required in travel on the railroad between these two points is 17 hours.

Since the death of Miss Rose in 1914, Otaru has not been occupied by a missionary, but Miss Monk has visited there weekly, and the Kindergarten has continued with a monthly mothers' meeting, a young men's singing class, a young women's Bible class, and two Sunday Schools. She has also carried on a week-day Bible School for the fishermen's children at *Zenibako*, and preaching services have been held there.

EDUCATIONAL.—

In the Sapporo Girls' School, there were nearly 200 pupils, of which 80 were boarders. There were 13 baptisms during the year, and 42 inquirers. Only one of the teachers is not a Christian. The evangelistic power of the school is shown by carrying on four large and flourishing Sunday Schools. The Christian Endeavor Societies of the schools sent a contribution to the War sufferers in Belgium. Miss Evans finds opportunity to help in the Y. W. C. A. of Sapporo, which works especially among the non-Christian girl students of the Government Schools.
